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

Discipleship Team Gears up for a Great Year!

It is hard to believe that this Texas boy has been in Minnesota for 11 months already. During my short time at St. Hubert I have been offered the greatest hospitality and welcome. The team that I have the honor to work with is one of the best that I have ever witnessed. We as a discipleship team have been a work in progress this year, but one thing has never wavered – our commitment to bring the faith of the Catholic Church to all of the parishioners of St. Hubert and to all those who participate in our discipleship programs.

At the beginning of this catechetical year we were without a youth minister – but did that stop us? Absolutely not! Our newly ordained Fr. Aric Aamodt stepped forward without hesitation and took the lead of shepherding our middle school, high school, and Legacy Team. During this time, not only did Fr. Aric lead our youth through the sacramental life of the Church, but he mentored these young members of our faith through games, catechesis, and prayer.

In January, Gabbie Geraty joined our Discipleship Team as the associate director of discipleship for elementary catechesis. Coming in mid year did not slow down Gabbie at all. She began immediately to oversee early childhood programming, elementary catechesis, sacrament preparation, and Vacation Bible School, and to become an active member of the parish staff team as if she had been working at St. Hubert for years. Gabbie already has her sights on future programs that she wants to introduce at St. Hubert.

Emily Fonseca was one of the new teachers this year at St. Hubert Catholic School. When Emily originally accepted the position as the seventh and eighth grade religion teacher, she had no idea what was truly to come. Emily graciously accepted the role of coordinating both the school and the parish Confirmation programs. This incredible woman of God has truly been a gift to all involved in our Confirmation preparation.

As of June 1, the newest member of our team joined us. Corey Manning is our associate director of discipleship for young adults and youth ministry. Not only will Corey be using his talents to assist Fr. Aric in serving middle school and high school students, but he will also be reaching out to those that I believe are the most forgotten – the young adults of our community. His efforts will be to make certain this group knows they are loved and active, important members of St. Hubert.

A couple months ago, she became the administrative assistant to the discipleship team while still assisting the liturgy team and serving as Fr. Tollefson’s executive assistant. As incredible as the parish and discipleship teams are, programs cannot exist without some amazing volunteers. St. Hubert parishioners continue to serve and bring the Gospel alive. 3 Questions our Youth are Asking

I have been a priest and associate pastor at St. Hubert, for a little over a year now. For most of this year, I have also served as the youth minister for St. Hubert. It was not something I expected, but there was a need, the Lord inspired me to fill it, and I have loved doing it!

It is almost like a microcosm of the parish: I have this particular group of people whom I serve; I pray nearly constantly for them; all my efforts at the altar, in the pulpit, in the confessional, and in the office relate to them; I rejoice to see them growing in the life of Christ; and I join in their struggles as they share them with me. I may not have expected it, but I am grateful that this is how God's providence has led me to serve Him.

As I have tried to serve the young people of our parish and school this year, I recognize that young people seek the answers to three particular questions: *Am I likeable? Am I lovable? Am I capable?* They ask these things, first of all, of their parents. Mom and Dad have been the ones that they have looked at to learn everything else in life. Now that they have reached the edge of adulthood, these qualities are what they want to learn from Mom and Dad as they prepare to live life on their own. Moms and Dads, I hope you are answering these questions for them!

They are not asking them explicitly, but rather in more subtle ways. I hope you respond in ways that are less subtle, so that they know they are likeable, lovable, and capable.

These are also the questions that I seek to answer in the youth ministry here at St. Hubert. Whether it is the middle schoolers who come to Edge or the high schoolers who come to Overtime, I want all our young people to know that it's okay to ask these questions and to seek the answers. Those who are regulars in our youth ministry answer these questions by the examples they set for one another.

"Am I likeable?"

"Well, sometimes you're a bit crazy, but we enjoy the craziness."

"Am I lovable?"

"Each person here loves each other person, and we want to see you filled with life and joy."

"Am I capable?"

"We will work together to accomplish something greater than each of us."

Beyond what we do in youth ministry, all my prayers, efforts, and desires are oriented toward helping our young people discover that God also has answers to their questions.

"Am I likeable?"

God says, "I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father" (John 15:15).

"Am I lovable?"

God tells us, "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love" (John 15:9).

"Am I capable?"

God reminds us, "Amen, amen, I say to you, the one who believes in Me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these" (John 14:12).

No matter what we do in youth ministry - the fun, the service, the learning, the prayer - I hope that these truths revealed to us in Jesus Christ will be received by all our young people - and really by every person here at St. Hubert.

Meet Corey Manning

Associate Director of Discipleship for Young Adults and Youth Ministry *By Corey Manning*

Hello, my name is Corey Manning and I grew up in Forest Lake, Minnesota, where I graduated from Forest Lake High School. After high school I attended the University of Minnesota-Duluth (UMD). Half way through sophomore year I met a FOCUS Missionary named Dan and I discovered my faith. He befriended me and invited me into a deeper relationship with Christ and His Church. FOCUS stands for the Fellowship of Catholic University Students and is a Catholic organization of college campus missionaries. God used Dan and FOCUS in order to remove me from the destructive, secular college behavior I was experiencing and bring me back to the Catholic faith.

Following my sophomore year at UMD I felt the Lord calling me to the seminary. I spent three amazing years at St. John Vianney College Seminary at the University of St. Thomas in St Paul, MN. I absolutely loved my time there, especially the mission of serving the poor in the Friar's homeless shelter, but as time went on it became clear to me that the Lord was asking me to pursue a different vocation, the vocation of holy marriage.

It was with this new vocation pursuit that I now had to find where the Lord was calling me to serve while pursuing the calling to marriage. The Lord made it very clear to me in prayer to become a FOCUS missionary. It has been a true honor to be on campus reaching out to students who need and desire guidance. I saw myself in them just a few years ago and it was a privilege to have God use me to be a witness to and missionary of the Catholic faith during my time on campus.

I was married on May 13th, 2017 (The 100th Anniversary of Our Lady of Fatima). My wife Alysia and I had our first son, Malachi Job Manning, on March 16th, 2018! My family and I have just finished our fourth year with FOCUS and are excited to be back in the Twin Cities. It has been put on my heart to become a part of the New Evangelization in parish life. I was very excited to find St. Hubert and to join this dynamic staff in helping to meet the needs of the parish community.



I am looking forward to helping to execute the vision of Father Tollefson and the parish community, especially in the realm of discipleship. I am eager to use my gifts and knowledge of discipleship to invite others into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ and His Church as well as to inspire and equip others to do the same.

World Youth Day Reflection

This past January, we were blessed to attend the latest World Youth Day, hosted in Panama City. World Youth Day is an international event founded by Pope St. John Paul II in 1985, with the intention to gather young people from around the world together with the Pope to celebrate our Catholic faith. It happens every three or four years at different locations around the world, each time attracting up to five million young people.

didn't have a functioning heating system! We suffered eight grueling hours in sub-zero temperatures while we rode and tried to sleep on the bus to Chicago. That certainly wouldn't be the only pilgrimage experience we would get, we were sanctified by the long days, long walks, and temperatures in the 90's throughout the trip.

We went with a group organized by the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis, consisting of about 30 high school and college students plus chaperones. We also had the gift of being accompanied by Bishop Cozzens for the whole week. We were warned at the beginning of the trip that our experience would certainly not be easy, but a pilgrimage, and that we would have to overcome trials on this trip in our quest for holiness. This was evident immediately in our trip, when our overnight bus to the Chicago airport

We landed in Panama on Monday and quickly got accustomed to the crowded city. Throughout the next few days we attended various World Youth Day events such as the commencement Mass, catechetical sessions, and festivals with speakers from around the world, featuring dynamic speakers, music, and Adoration. Pope Francis arrived in Panama on Wednesday, and from Thursday until Sunday he appeared publicly. We were fortunate enough to be present with him for his Papal Welcoming Ceremony on Thursday, as well as Saturday for Adoration, and



Sunday for the Closing Mass.

The tradition on the last day of World Youth Day is for the pilgrims to spend the night under the stars, and then to have the Closing Mass with the Pope the next morning in the same field where all had slept. On Saturday as well as Sunday, we walked roughly ten miles to get to and from the field where we had Adoration. We slept Saturday night under the stars and woke up to attend the Closing Mass celebrated by the Pope with 700,000 other pilgrims. After the conclusion of World Youth Day, we spent the next few days touring the Panama Canal as well as exploring the surrounding rainforests of Panama watching monkeys, crocodiles, and sloths.

Our favorite aspects of the trip were the night we got to sleep out under the stars and also the Fiat Festival, the biggest English-speaking gathering of the week. Panama City is unlike anything we've ever experienced, with incredible architecture and tradition spread throughout the culture. During World Youth Day, the city took on an energizing atmosphere, making a big city feel like home. Throughout the trip, we encountered a number of groups like ours from all around the world, including Brazil, Panama, Korea, New Zealand, Sweden, Germany, England, and fellow Americans like us.

For us, our entire World Youth Day experience illustrated the meaning of the Mystical Body of Christ, because previously we hadn't encountered different Catholic cultures outside of our little Minnesota bubble. We won't forget this experience anytime soon and we would encourage anyone who is interested in traveling, meeting other young Catholics from around the world, and experiencing the Holy Spirit in an active way to go to the next World Youth Day which will be held 2022 in Portugal.

109 Receive Sacrament of Confirmation

On Monday, May 20, 109 St. Hubert Catholic Community candidates received the Sacrament of Confirmation at the Cathedral of St. Paul. It was a beautiful evening celebrated by Archbishop Hebda. Our students were joined by about 100 others from two parishes in receiving the Sacrament.

Our students had been preparing for Confirmation since early fall using the *Chosen* series by Ascension Press. This series included several videos, personal stories, and small group time to help the students dive deeper into their faith with their peers. All topics that were discussed, from "Who is Jesus?" to "Why have I been Chosen?", were intended to help them grasp the beauty of the Catholic faith and how they, as young people, can be proactive and take ownership of their faith.

Students learned how to pray, about their future vocations, and

some practical ways they can say "yes" to Christ and His Church after Confirmation, with the understanding that Confirmation is just the beginning of their journey, not the end. In Archbishop Hebda's homily at Confirmation, he talked about having a spiritual backpack with tools to continue on the journey that the Lord has planned for them. These tools included prayer, surrounding yourself with good people, going to Mass, and receiving the sacraments.

It was wonderful to see the students be anointed with chrism and receive the final Sacrament of Initiation. After many months of anticipation, they were finally able to have the gifts of the Holy Spirit strengthened and renewed in their lives. May we as a community continue to pray and support these young people in their journeys with Christ.



A New Format for Parish Discipleship Nights

Introducing Our New Principal

It is with great honor that I have accepted the position of principal at St. Hubert Catholic School. To introduce myself I would like to share some of my background and experience.

Since July 2011 I have served as the assistant principal at Seton Catholic Preparatory (SCP) in Chandler, Arizona where I developed, implemented, and led academic programs for 580 students and 70 faculty and staff. Over the past five years I have had the opportunity to guide the development of several new program initiatives at SCP, including an engineering program, new technology initiatives, a faculty mentoring program, an under-performing student support program, and a house program designed to foster community among the Seton student population. Additionally, I worked with academic departments to ensure successful scoping and sequencing of the SCP curriculum, while developing and implementing new courses. The scope and scale of this work has contributed to an average ACT score better than the 85th percentile, with Seton being recognized as a 2017 National Blue Ribbon School by the United States Department of Education.

Prior to my position at Seton, I was a teacher, department chair, and dean of students at Providence Academy in Plymouth, MN. The opportunity to serve as a founding faculty member at a pre-K through 12th grade independent Catholic school provided a foundation that is unparalleled. The opportunities afforded me both personally and professionally through outstanding mentors to create a Catholic institution of excellence is both a cherished memory and proud accomplishment in my career. An experience of opportunities and challenges, it was this position that truly laid the foundation for my appreciation and pursuit of excellence in Catholic education.

In May 2016 I completed my Ed.D. in Leadership and Innovation at Arizona State University. My action research dissertation focused on the leadership development of high school students using a service-learning curriculum to foster youth-led distributed leadership throughout the school. More specifically, I researched the use of transformative leadership as a framework to understand how high school students researched, enacted, and understood their power and ability to elicit change and become leaders in the world around them. It was the intersection of leadership development, service-learning, and Catholic social teaching that enabled students to understand and enact identities as transformative leaders.

The foundations of this work have transferred into my own practice as a transformative leader in the ways I collaborate with faculty, staff, parents, and students to create an environment in which each member is valued and respected, and in which each person is ultimately known, loved, and served.

Most recently, I have had the opportunity to work at the University of Notre Dame as a faculty member in the Mary Ann Remick Leadership Program. My responsibilities include teaching executive management courses focusing on effective school management, as well as the masters thesis research course. In this space and capacity, I receive an intimate glimpse of the current national Catholic educational landscape. Connecting with Catholic school leaders across the country provides opportunities for conversation and understanding of those issues and opportunities facing Catholic schools, as well as personal connections with outstanding institutions and leaders.

actors, and movie-like sound effects and music. It's sound entertainment that will delight and surprise you, and a wholesome alternative to the radio."


Memorize Bible Verses

Print one of your favorite verses and hang it on the fridge. Practice every day until you and your family have it memorized. Then when you hear the verse said in the Mass readings, it will become much more meaningful. Here are some options for starters:

- shall not perish but have eternal life.




